FIRST STEPS FOR SENIORS

- Your school counselor will begin scheduling meetings with each of you 1:1 in regards to your post-secondary plans. (Look out for an email coming soon with more information)
- Check google classroom regularly for updates on upcoming activities, college fairs, links to important documents, ex: College One Stop Shop, Scholarships etc....
- Complete the Counselor Brag sheet and Senior college profiles promptly once these links are share with you.
- Many colleges have remained Test Optional- however you may still wish to register for an
 upcoming SAT or ACT to improve your score- always do your research so you are aware which
 schools require the submission of an SAT / ACT result. (email your counselor to check if you
 qualify for a fee waiver)
- Any student planning to apply Early Decision or Early Action deadline 11/01 or 11/15 must notify their counselor ASAP
- Any student who is completing the Questbridge Application or is moving forward in the POSSE
 Scholarship process must notify their counselor ASAP
- Complete the income inquiry form- https://www.myschoolapps.com/Home/PickDistrict This form is what determines fee waivers!

Managing your Time & Stress-Level:



□ Utilize a planner or actively use your google calendar



- Always input important dates, class schedule time, deadlines on your planner/calendar
- □ Create a To-Do List to figure out what's the most important and due the soonest
- □ Create and set up a daily schedule that may include; study time, homework time, personal time and break time (Yes, we all need a little break (10-15 minutes) to practice Self-Care)
- □ Set alarms and reminders (you don't want to be late) for school and/or deadlines.

Have they begun to think about getting letters of recommendation? Our goal is for all college applications to be submitted by **Thanksgiving** PLEASE BE MINDFUL OF DEADLINES!!!!!!

How Do You Define College?

- Two year vs. four year
- Public, Private, SUNY, CUNY, HBCU
- Location
- Setting urban, suburban, rural
- Size small, medium, large
- Distance from home commute or dorm



You do:

- Decide what's best for you
- Research colleges
- Speak as a family about where to apply
- Fill out college applications and track deadlines
- → Request SAT/ACT scores to be sent
- Request and handle teacher recommendations
- Read **ALL** of the college office emails!
- Attend scheduled meetings with college advisors

We do:

- Help you consider your options
- Offer college suggestions
- Send transcripts and school profiles when requested
- ☑ Write your counselor recommendation (if required)
- □ Keep you informed about the application and financial aid process
- Support and aid you through the process (and congratulate you when you get in!)

1:1 Post-Secondary Meetings

- Individual Post-Secondary Planning Meetings will begin soon. Make sure your child has completed the Student College Profile:
 - Ms. Byrd's Student College Profile
 - Ms. Lockhart's Student College Profile
 - Ms. Payne's Student College Profile
 - STUDENTS WHO WILL APPLY EARLY ACTION OR EARLY DECISION MUST INFORM THEIR COUNSELOR ASAP
 - Bring list of schools they are interested in
 - Bring their questions
- College applications require an email; please make sure your child has an appropriate email address and checks it regularly (not the @nycstudents.net)

The Application Process

Admissions

- Early Action/Early Decision
 - Early Decision: binding, you are saying that if you get in you will go
 - Early Action: non-binding
- Regular Decision
 - Apply by the deadline, and the college will let you know by a specified date
- Rolling Admissions
 - Schools review applications as they are submitted
 - Apply early: classes will fill up!
- Opportunity Programs
 - EOP/HEOP/SEEK/College Discovery

Finding Your Best Fit

Reach

Students' GPA and Test Scores are *lower* than the average for admitted students.

Appropriate Reach

 - If possible, try to schedule visits in the spring once you are accepted



Ask yourself if you can see yourself going to that college?





What are Colleges Looking For?


- → Transcripts
 - Types and rigor of classes
- → Standardized Test Scores (if you have them)
 - SAT
 - ACT
 - Test optional
- → Personal Essay





What are Colleges Looking For? Continued...

- → In School Extracurricular Activities
 - Position
 - Time participated
- → Sports
- → Recognitions
 - Achievements/Awards/Honors
- → Outside of School Activities
 - Clubs/Organizations
 - Internships
 - Volunteer Experience
- → Work Experience



Test Scores






- <u>CUNYs= Test Optional</u> (it is not required to submit your SAT/ACT scores but if you scored fairly well, consider sending them in for scholarship opportunities)
- <u>SUNYs= Test Optional</u> (it is not required to submit your SAT/ACT scores but if you scored fairly well, consider sending them in for scholarship opportunities)
- Private College/Universities = most are test optional
 - To check colleges that are test optional by state go to <u>https://fairtest.org/test-optional-list/</u>

Personal Essay


- Where do I start?
 - Positive characteristics
 - Best qualities
 - Overcoming adversity
- Tips
 - Start early
 - Be honest
 - Proofread
 - Get feedback
 - Edit, Edit, Edit!



THIS YEAR MANY SCHOOLS ARE REQUIRING ADDITIONAL SCHOOL SPECIFIC "SUPPLEMENTAL" ESSAYS BECAUSE THEY ARE TEST OPTIONAL

WRITE ESSAYS

- Your essay is your chance to show who you are and how well you write
- Speak honestly and let your personality shine through
- Write in your own voice—don't try to sound impressive, don't overuse a thesaurus!
- Submit polished and thoroughly edited essays
- Essays don't always have to be school- or arts-related
- Consider writing school-specific essays for reach schools



RECOMMENDATION LETTERS

- Which schools need them? How many? From whom?
- Most schools require one from your School Counselor. Make sure to invite your School Counselor on the college application and complete the "Brag Sheet"
- Not sure if a teacher feels comfortable writing a strong letter for you?
 Ask!
- Always give teacher at least 2 weeks to complete
- Most are electronic, make sure you "invite" the teacher using the correct email address
- Teachers put lots of time into these–send a Thank You note!

Take a look at template on One Stop Shop







- Save time on your college applications!!
- CommonApp used by over 900 colleges/universities
- Coalition App used by 150+ schools
- Applications are completed entirely online
- Fill it out once and send to all of the colleges using that platform
 - Note: There are often supplements for individual schools
- Each college has a different fee
- Keep in mind: Fee waivers are available for the CommonApp provided that you are eligible

Applying to CUNY and SUNY schools



The City University of New York

- Completed entirely online
- Apply for up to 6 schools on one application
- Pay ONE \$65 fee (Fee waivers will be available based on Income Verification Form.)
- Include OSIS #

The State University of New York

- Apply through SUNY website (if students are applying to both SUNYs and Private colleges, it is recommended to use the Common App)
- Apply to multiple campuses with same application (supplements often required)
- Pay \$50 fee per school (fee waivers cover up to 7 schools)

The City University of New York

Beginning October 1st - October 31st, students can apply to CUNY for free.

What Should The Student Be Doing?

- Complete the Student College Profile (if you haven't already)
- Prepare and register for upcoming SAT/ACT exams
 - School code: 330938
 - Email your School Counselor for a Fee Waiver (if you qualify)
- Research colleges and careers using www.bigfuture.collegeboard.org/college-search
- Complete the Student Brag Sheet and list activities and accomplishments
- Request recommendation letters
- Begin/finalize writing your personal statement
- Read the College One Stop Shop carefully
- Create FSA ID (if you haven't already)
- Apply to Scholarships

CSS Profile

- The FAFSA application will open December 31st, 2023.
 - Students are to complete the 2024-2025 application
 - You will need your parent(s)/guardian(s) 2022 taxes, and yours if you filed taxes
- Following the FAFSA, you will apply for TAP which is New York
 State Aid
- Complete the CSS Profile if it is required
- Apply to scholarships! (check out our Scholarships & Opportunities Book!)
